



SOLICITATION AT A GLANCE

2025 Solicitation - Applications due in March

\$5,000,000 available for Tribes and Tribal Non-Profits

For planning, implementation, and/or training

Grant Size: \$250,000 - \$3,000,000 Project End Date: March 30, 2028


Reimbursements; option of advance payments

Eligible Locations: Any ancestral land in California, applicant must have long-term access

2025 WHAT'S NEW

Changes

- Stand-Alone Solicitation (not part of Forest Health solicitation)
- Eligibility expanded, now includes tribally led non-profits
- Projects can combine planning, training, & implementation
- CEQA discussions as part of application
- CCI Funding May Be Used

Clarifications

- Limited Waivers of Sovereign Immunity required for many projects with federally recognized tribes
- CEQA applies to all projects
- Grantee must have long-term access to the project area. This can be co-management, MOU, etc.



NATIVE-SERVING NON-PROFIT DOCUMENTATION

- · Eligibility expanded
- All applications will include eligibility description & documentation
- For Tribal-serving nonprofits:
 - 1) Contact TWR to discuss (no one wants to spend lots of time on an application if we know you won't be eligible)
 - 2) Letter of Support from a California Native Tribe
 - 3) Description & documentation that the nonprofit is tribally led. For example: majority-tribal board; mission statement & programs, etc.
 - 4) Describe how project serves tribal communities

TRIBAL DATA SOVEREIGNTY & SPATIAL DATA

- We recognize tribal data sovereignty is important. Tribes may have sensitive or confidential locations.
- Spatial data (polygons, maps) of acres treated will be posted on CalMAPPER alongside other fuels treatment projects.
- This is available to emergency responders and to the public for planning landscape resilience.

Spatial data requirements for all implementation work*

Ensure capacity and funds to track this work



Furnish spatial data quarterly





UPDATED: LIMITED WAIVERS OF SOVEREIGN IMMUNITY

- We recognize that tribal sovereignty is important, and waiving tribal sovereignty in any way is a serious issue
- CAL FIRE stewards public funds, and has responsibilities to manage risk and account for public dollars
- CAL FIRE-wide policy in development
- LWSI likely required for federally recognized tribes whose projects include any of:
 - · Advance payments
 - Equipment purchases
 - On-the-ground work (fuels reduction, fire)
 - · New to financial management of grants
- Each one is individually negotiated

ENVIRONMENTAL COMPLIANCE


- CEQA applies to **ALL** projects
 - Yes, it applies to the funding source even for projects by federally recognized tribes that usually only have NEPA
 - Yes, planning-only projects will still need to confirm with TWR on CEQA needs
- Proposal discussions required
- This can be done at Environmental Compliance Office Hours.








INVOICING

- Reimbursements
- Option for 6-month advance funds
- Work in-house and/or with subcontractors
- Ineligible Costs:
 - Roads, Culverts, Buildings
 - Fundraising, Endowments, Cash Reserves
 - Payment of a debt or mortgage
 - Lobbying or Lawsuits
 - Sub-granting or re-granting









THINGS WE DON'T FUND (& OTHERS DO)

- Land purchase (Tribal Nature-Based Solutions Program)
- Conservation easements (Forest Legacy)
- Smaller-scale projects (California Forest Improvement Program)
- Disaster recovery (CalOES, FEMA)
- Research (Forest Health Research Program)
- Businesses, infrastructure (Business Development Grants)
- · Riparian-focused restoration (CDFW, WCB)

PROJECT LOCATIONS


- Required: Within State of California
- Required: Ancestral land, as defined by the tribe
- Tribal land such as trust, allotment, fee title
- Partner with other landowners: Needs long-term access
 - Forest Service, Local Parks District, Privately owned...
 - Access agreement, Co-management, Memorandum of Understanding, etc.
- Letters of Support from other tribes with current and/or ancestral ties to that area
