#### Forest Management Plan Requirement & Purpose

<u>PRC § 4645</u>: The department, in accordance with **plans approved by the board**, may engage in the management, protection, and reforestation of state forests.

PRC § 4645: The director, acting in accordance with **policies adopted by the board**, shall administer this chapter.

CA Board of Forestry & Fire Protection Policies, Chapter 0351.10

Management Plans ... shall be **prepared by the Department**, with appropriate public review, for approval by the Board. CAL FIRE shall present to the Board a thorough review of each existing management plan **at least every ten years**.


#### The Forest Management Plan:

- establishes abundant opportunities for future research and demonstration activities


#### Forest Management Plan Requirement & Purpose


## How does a project get reviewed and approved at JDSF?

The process for Project approval at JDSF starts with the Forest Management Plan.

Management Plan Goals & Objectives


California Forest Practice Rules



When JDSF staff has enough work to show the scope of the project, proposed project gets scheduled for a JAG meeting

Submission of environmental permitting documents to multi-agency review team (CalTrees)

Multi-agency review team is made up of Water Quality Board,
California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW), California
Geologic Survey (CGS), CALFIRE
Forest Practice, and others. This process usually takes over 3 months and includes a 45-day formal public comment period.



Approved projects can be amended if needed i.e. road placement

Re-evaluate if project is viable

Work begins on tasks such as: culvert sizing, rock estimates, recreation, timber marking, research layout, etc.

These are tasks that were not required in the permitting documentation

#### **EPILOGUE**

Monitoring/data collection period

(3-5 years)



Timber Harvest Plans, along with most projects require monitoring by law and if the project contained a research component there is a data collection period







#### **EXAMPLE**

#### JDSF TIMBER SALE DEVELOPMENT PROCESS DRAFT

1. Sustainable Forest Management Forecasting
<ul> <li>Provide annual map to Jackson Advisory Group (JAG) and Tribal Advisory Council identifying potential future management areas.</li> <li>Prioritize development of timber harvest plans based on feedback JAG, Tribal Advisory Council, and public.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>2. JAG Review</li> <li>Early notification to local Tribes of project footprint and goals.</li> <li>Early development of timber harvesting plan (THP) including identifying</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>research, restoration, recreation, and fuel reduction opportunities.</li> <li>JAG Review of proposal, including field tour.</li> <li>JAG and local Tribal recommendations incorporated into plan.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>JAG Approval</li> <li>JAG determines if project is in compliance with the Management Plan and New Vision (until management plan review is complete).</li> </ul>
4. THP Permitting  CEQA required notification to local tribes.  JDSF staff completes development of THP and submits for multidisciplinary review process.  Outreach to potential research partners.
<ul> <li>5. Pre-Timber Sale Public Tour (optional)</li> <li>This tour will take place during development of the Timber Sale</li> <li>Show approved THP field work.</li> <li>Discuss additional contract items to include in timber sale agreement such as recreation improvements, timber stand improvements, fuel reduction opportunities, firewood sales, and aesthetic concerns.</li> <li>Tour is optional based on public interest and JDSF staff availability.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>6. Timber Sale and Operation</li> <li>Advertise and award Timber Sale</li> <li>JDSF staff conducts contract administration during operations.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>7. Post-Operations Public Tour (optional)</li> <li>May be at JAG meeting or separate.</li> <li>Review outcome verse identified management objectives.</li> <li>Review research and restoration projects</li> <li>Tour is optional based on public interest and JDSF staff availability.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>8. Adaptive Management</li> <li>Produce timber sale summary documenting operations, any challenges, and recommendations for future projects for JDSF records.</li> <li>Incorporate lessons learned into future projects.</li> </ul>
