#### SUBJECT/AGENDA ACTION ITEM:

Fire Fighter Certification Exam Psychomotor Skill Issuance

### **Recommended Actions:**

Approval of Fire Fighter Certification Exam Psychomotor Skill Issuance with consideration to the skill level, cost, and associated Registered Evaluator/staffing needs.

## **Background Information:**

State Fire Training (SFT) manages the Fire Fighter 1 and 2 curriculum, Certification Exams, and Certification requirements. SFT has 65 Accredited Regional Training Programs (ARTPs) and Accredited Local Academies (ALAs) currently administering the Certification Exams with student participation increasing exponentially. To accommodate the complexity of statewide participants, the Certification Exam processes have been expanded to allow for simulation of select Certification Exam skills.

## Analysis/Summary of Issue:

Several academies were queried for their feedback regarding the delivery of the Fire Fighter 1 and 2 (2019) Certification Examination processes with specific input on costs, assessed skill level, and the associated cost/time of Registered Lead/Skill Evaluator or other staff needs for successful exam delivery. The participants included Long Beach Fire Department, Sacramento Fire Department, Santa Ana College, and Santa Rose Junior College.

Each were provided a prepared Excel spreadsheet will fillable columns for each Fire Fighter 1 and 2 (2019) skill, requiring identification within those columns of Low-Medium-High. Each ALA/ARTP reviewed each skill and provided feedback specific to their agency/facility. The intent was to identify the most costly and time-consuming skills while

further identifying those skills that require specific and/or excess staff (personnel, cost, hours) to complete.

The Psychomotor Certification Exam skill issuance is:

- Fire Fighter 1A
  - Seven (7) Required (Mandatory) Skills
  - Three (3) Random Skills
- Fire Fighter 1B
  - One (1) Required (Mandatory) Skill
  - Two (2) Random Skills
- Fire Fighter 1C
  - Six (6) Required (Mandatory) Skills
  - o Two (2) Random Skills
- Fire Fighter 2A
  - o Two (2) Required (Mandatory) Skills
  - Three (3) Random Skills

The data shows that the existing Mandatory Skills do not incur any excess cost or staffing needs. The feedback received finds common identification of the Random Skills that require additional personnel, materials, and time for set-up/reset between candidates. These findings support the proposal for a tiered system that will provide academies with equitably distributed skills with consideration to the cost and materials associated with the higher skill-level tasks. The categorization of the skills will provide equitable assignment of Random Skills to balance the issuance inclusive of the three groupings.
