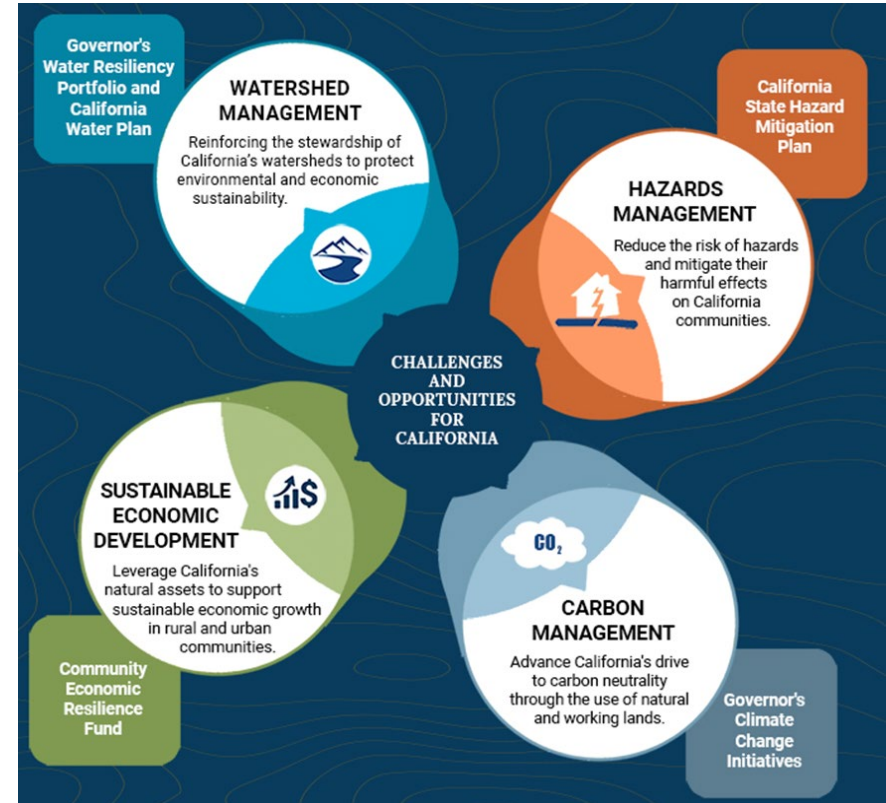

- Implement goals of CA Forest Carbon Plan & Executive Order B-52-18 (increase pace & scale of forest treatments)

Funding and Status

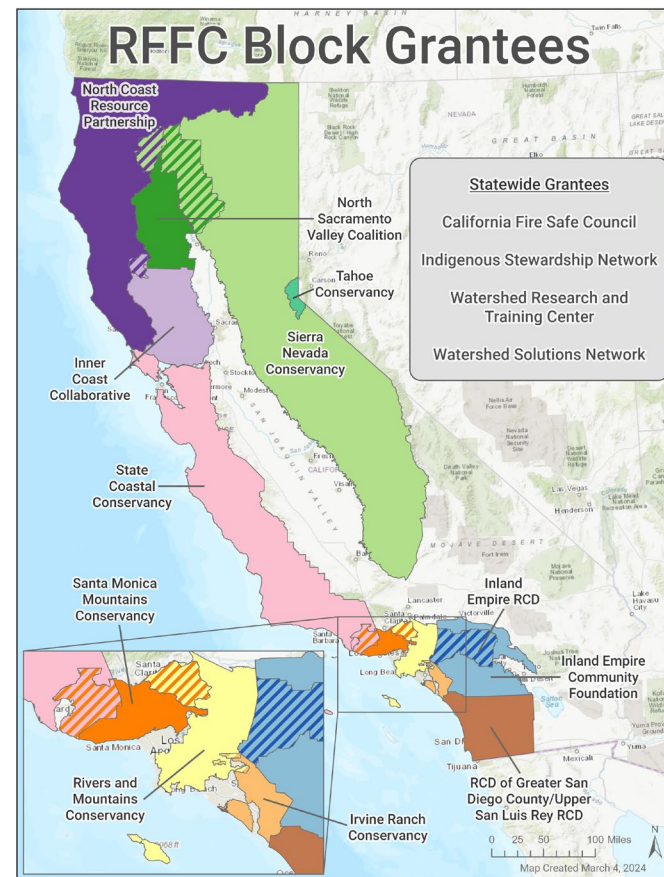
\$142 million invested in **12 Regional Grantees** & **6 Statewide Grantees** to date.

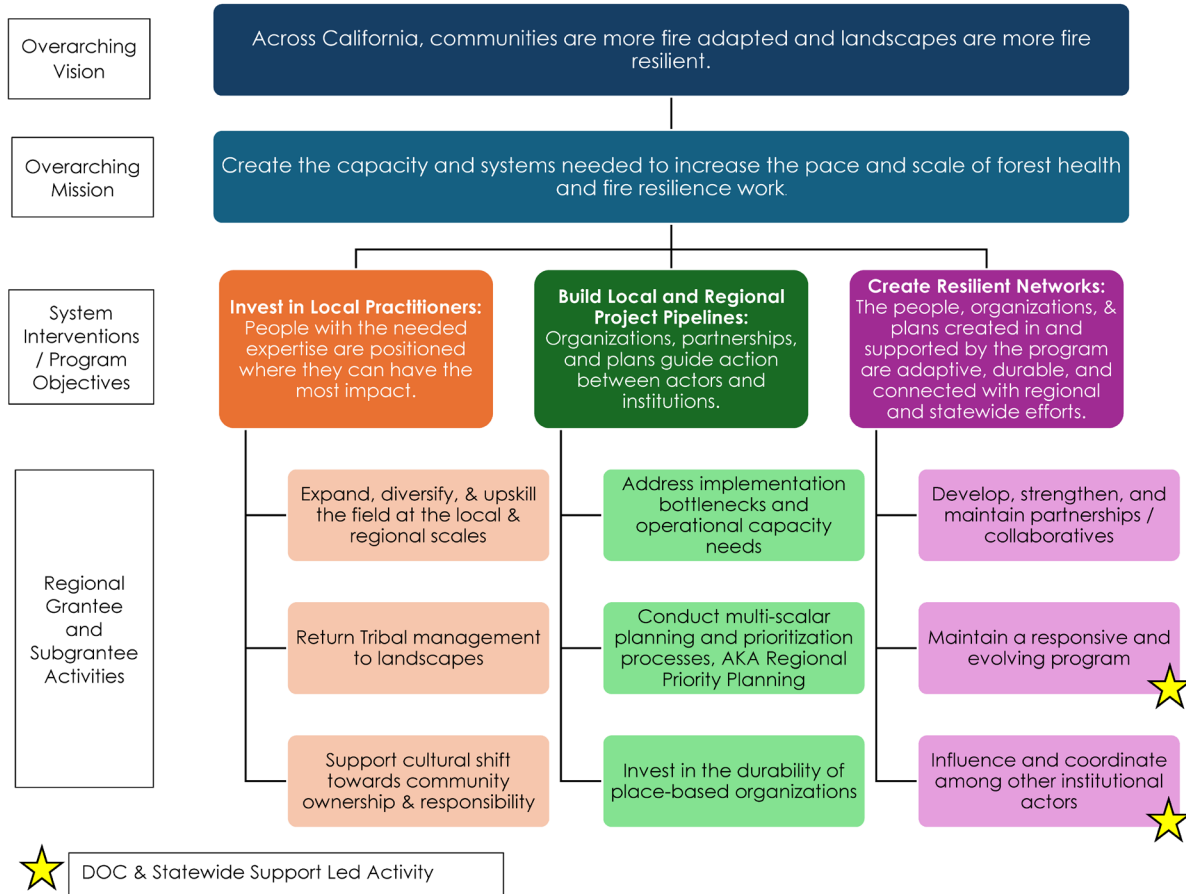

Figure 4-1 Existing Vegetation Types within the PPSA

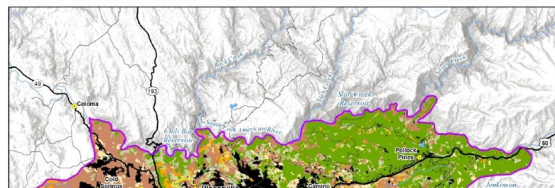


Figure 5-8 Mean Conditional Flame Length and One-Way In/Out Neighborhoods

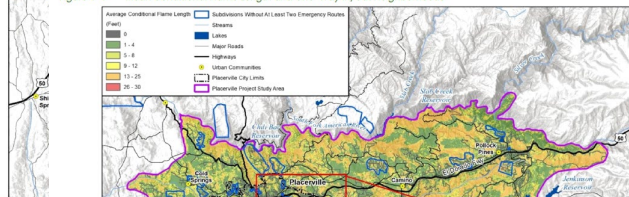


Figure 6-8 Existing, Active/In-Progress and Proposed Fuel Treatment Projects as of January 2025

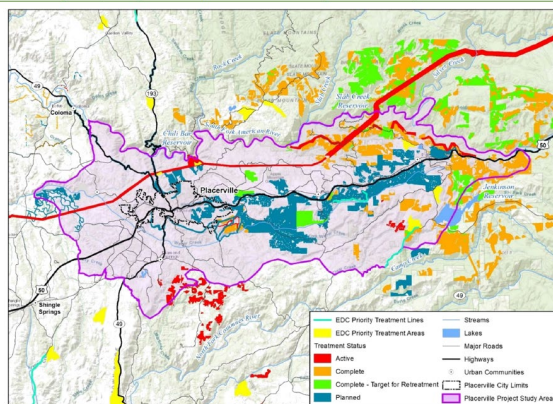
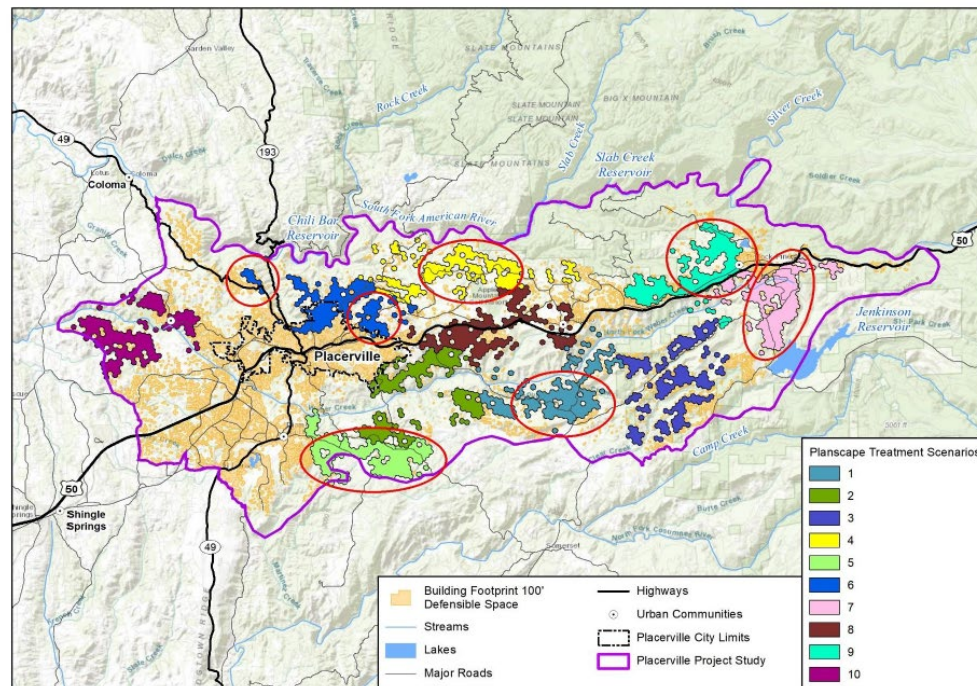


Figure 6-11 Planscape Treatment Scenarios

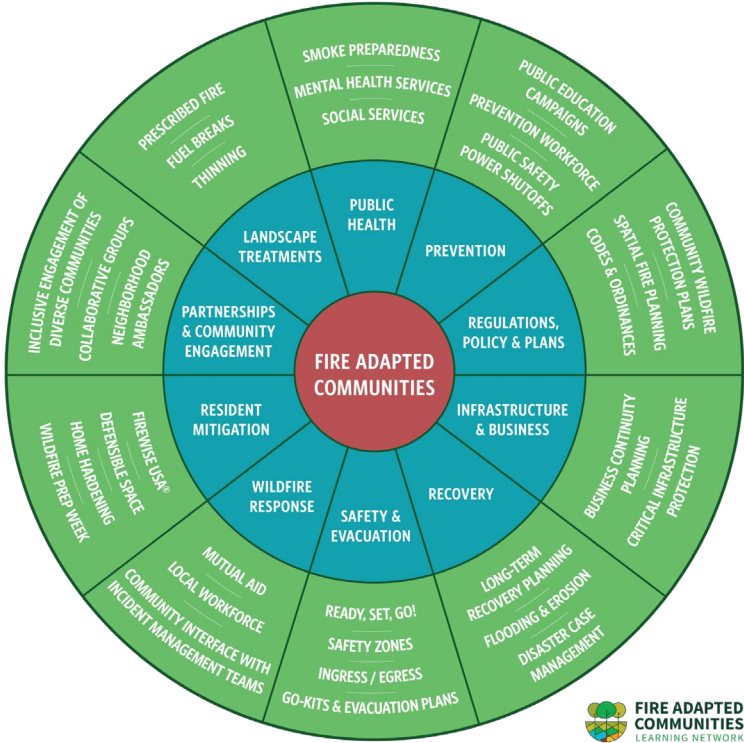

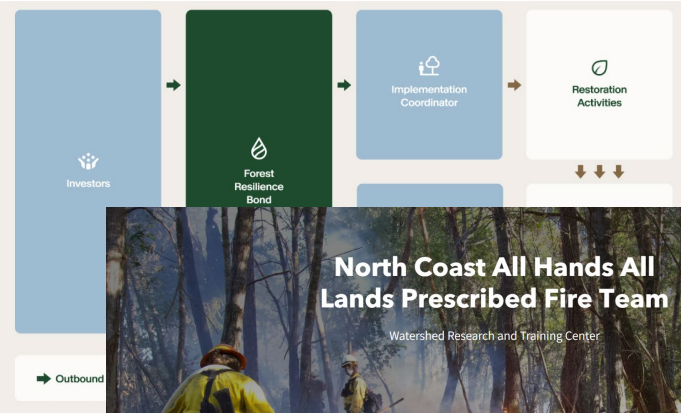

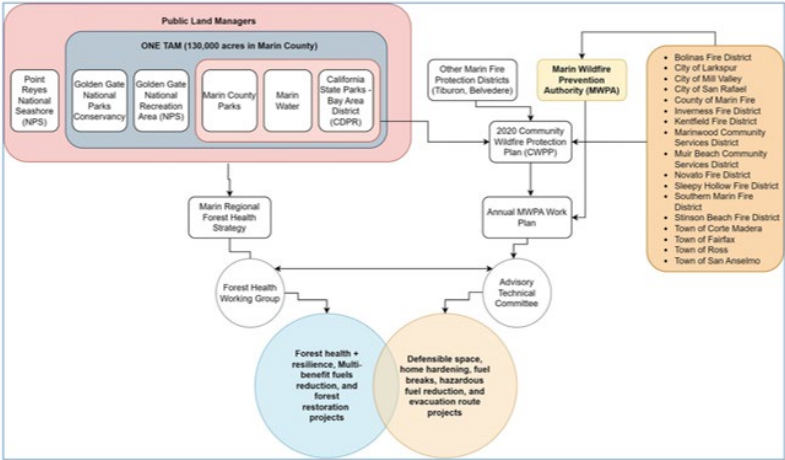
