RISK MODELING ADVISORY WORKGROUP

CAL FIRE - Office of the State Fire Marshal Risk Modeling Advisory Workgroup Charter

PURPOSE

The Risk Modeling Advisory Workgroup (Workgroup) will provide a means to understand and model wildfire risk for a community and specified parcels through the input of mitigating factors. The Workgroup will provide a forum for subject matter experts in wildfire related fields to address wildfire risk modeling issues of statewide concern. CAL FIRE shall post the recommendations on how to understand and model risk for a community and specific parcel on the department's internet website.

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

The Workgroup is being formed pursuant to Assembly Bill 642 (Chapter 375, Statutes of 2021) to act in an advisory capacity to CAL FIRE, in consultation with the State Fire Marshal and the Insurance Commissioner on wildfire risk modeling. This Workgroup reports to the Wildfire Mitigation Advisory Committee.

Goal:

To provide science based solutions to enable CAL FIRE, in consultation with the State Fire Marshal, and the Insurance Commissioner to make recommendations on how to understand and model wildfire risk for a community and specific parcels within the local responsibility area or state responsibility area through the input of mitigating factors.

Objectives:

- Provide science based solutions to enable CAL FIRE, in consultation with the State Fire Marshal, and the Insurance Commissioner to make recommendation on how to understand and model wildfire risk on or before July 1, 2023
- Provide a discussion on how parcels can affect the risk of other parcels in close
 proximity to each other and what impacts that has on wildfire risk modeling
- Provide an evaluation of the effectiveness of using natural infrastructure as a community buffer and what impacts that has on wildfire risk modeling
- Review and provide a list of relevant wildfire risk research models from science, academia and industry, and other sources and their purpose and relevant attributes.
- Provide a list of identified barriers to determining the wildfire risk of a community and specific parcels

WORKGROUP MEMBERSHIP

Members of the Workgroup shall be all of the following:

- · The State Fire Marshal, or their designee
- The Director of Emergency Services, or their designee
- The Insurance Commissioner, or their designee
- The Director of State Planning and Research, or their designee
- · The Director of Housing and Community Development, or their designee
- A representative from insurers that has appropriate expertise in wildfire risk modeling, such as exposure measurement, risk modeling, and actuarial expertise, to be appointed by the department
- A representative from an insurance research organization that has appropriate expertise in wildfire risk modeling, such as exposure measurement, risk modeling, and actuarial expertise, to be appointed by the department
- A fire chief representative, to be appointed by the department in consultation with the California Fire Chiefs Association and the Fire Districts Association of California
- A fire prevention officer representative, to be appointed by the department in consultation with the California Fire Chiefs Association and the Fire Districts Association of California
- A representative from the California Professional Firefighters, to be appointed by the department
- A representative from the California Fire Science Consortium, to be appointed by the department
- A representative from the California Building Industry Association, to be appointed by the department
- A representative from a rural city or county of local government, to be appointed by the department
- · A representative from a local government, to be appointed by the department

The State Fire Marshal may decide to add any other appropriate stakeholders, including representatives from local governmental agencies.

The chairperson of the Committee shall be the State Fire Marshal, or the State Fire Marshal's designee. The vice chairperson of the advisory workgroup shall be the person filling the fire chief representative position.

The appointed members of the advisory workgroup shall serve at the pleasure of the department. The members of the Workgroup shall serve without compensation, but

each member shall be reimbursed for their actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties.

MEETINGS

- Schedule
 - The Committee shall meet on the third Monday of each month. If the meeting lands on a holiday, the Committee shall postpone and meet on the subsequent Monday.
- Location
 - o Meetings shall be regularly scheduled in Sacramento.
 - Meetings may be scheduled throughout the state on an as-needed basis.
- Meetings will not be cancelled without cause.

In order to ensure consistency and transparency, the following Roberts Rules of Order shall be adhered to:

- · An approved published agenda,
- · Meeting minutes,
- A quorum,
- Motions and seconds, and
- · Voting requirements (including requests for roll call voting).

Rules for recognition and timelines for debate will be suspended unless specifically enacted by the membership.

Meetings may be rescheduled if the Committee is unable to meet a quorum.

A motion will be passed by a simple majority of the entire voting membership.

All members, voting and non-voting, may submit informational, discussion, and/or action items for the agenda prior to the meeting. Agenda items will take precedent and non-agenda items may be transacted upon if time permits.

COMMITTEE PROTOCOL

- The Committee shall comply with Bagley-Keene Open Meeting Act
- Only items listed on the published agenda as "Motion Required" may be acted upon
- · The Committee chair has the authority to set time limits on any agenda item

PROCESS

- The Community Wildfire Preparedness and Mitigation Division will provide administrative support to the Committee
- Agenda items should be submitted to the Committee coordinator four weeks before the scheduled meeting date
- Minutes will be taken at each meeting that capture the essence and actions of the meeting
 - Draft minutes will be posted on the Office of the State Fire Marshal website for review by the Committee and other interested parties
 - After approval at the next meeting, final minutes will be posted on the Office of the State Fire Marshal website

QUORUM

A simple majority (50% plus 1) of the committee membership shall be a quorum.

RESPONSIBILITY OF THE CHAIR

· Interpretation and decisions are the purview of the chair

Wildfire Risk Reduction

- Burn Permits:
 - Policy and Procedures are being drafted now for the anticipated roll out of the new app.
- Land Use Planning / Safety Elements:
 - Staff have been actively engaged in numerous statewide projects of interest including:
 - Working with Cal OES on the State Hazard Mitigation Plan.
 - Working with OPR on the Wildfire Plan Alignment Guide.
 - Developing training for local planners on Land Use Planning for Wildfires.
- Defensible Space :
 - The Department has completed just under 180,000 D-Space inspections during this calendar year. This is 17,000 more than the Department had completed by this same time last year, with the increase being attributed to increased funding and permanent staffing.



Wildfire Risk Reduction

Subdivision Review:

 Surveys recently completed in LA County and Sonoma County, approx. 100 subdivision surveys will be up for review and approval by the BOF in November. Work continues in several areas, including El Dorado and Fresno Counties. Staff continue to collaborate with the local agency on recommendations to improve fire safety.

Firewise USA:

- California continues to lead the nation with 590 National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) Firewise USA Communities in good standing, equating to over 25% of all NFPA Firewise USA Communities nationwide. Staff are fielding lots of inquiries statewide as interest in the program continues to grow.
 - We will likely surpass the 600 mark within the next month or so!



Wildfire Risk Reduction

Utility Wildfire Mitigation:

- Developed a Utility Wildfire Mitigation Program website that provides:
 - Program Description
 - Program Contacts
 - Information on Public Resource Codes 4292/4293.
 - Powerline Fire Prevention Field Guide.
 - resource links to various utility fire prevention agencies, WMPs, etc.
 - Website can be found <u>here</u>.
- Hired Utility Fire Mitigation battalion chief position, who started on 10/10/22.
- Site visit with PG&E and local SHU Unit for reviewing 13 powerline violations for approx. 80 identified hazard trees (leaning trees).
- Energy Safety released Draft 2023-2025 WMP guidelines for review and comments.

Wildfire Planning and Statistics Update

California Incident Data & Statistics

- Completed uploading California's 2021 National Association of State Forester fire occurrence ignition data and working with them to get data uploaded into their new InFORM system. The new system will allow us to continue sharing our data using the new process that they plan to implement in future years.
- CA-NFIRS data for 2021 as of the deadline:
 - Total Incidents = 3,381,188 (up by 386,000 incidents)
 - Invalid/Unreleased = 70,492 2.8% (They can be updated or corrected at any time, program assists Local Fire Departments with correcting the errors.)
 - Total number of participating fire departments = 570 (up 20 from last year)





Wildfire Planning and Statistics Update

- Pre-Fire Planning

- Developing Fire Hazard Severity Zone training for Units & Contract Counties on procedures to conduct PRC-required public comment hearing, these will start on November 7th, 2022. Public hearings (one in each SRA county) will start December 15th thru the end of January.
- Monthly training is being scheduled for this winter for PFE engagement on SRA, DPA, Unit Fire Plans, and fire perimeter/ignition validations.
- The annual Pre-Fire training is being scheduled for early spring 2023.

Wildfire Planning and Statistics Update

Pre-Fire Planning

- Updates/improvements to the Pre-Fire Planning (Fire Plan) intranet page continue, we have been supporting several adjacent programs with our new staff and student/intern workforce. This includes developing new Camp/Crew/Facility maps, Local Contract maps, Radio Call Plan maps, CalMAPPER/AVL maps, and Leg maps, all being posted to their Program intranet webpages.
- Work is being done to resurrect CWPP data that had been hosted on now unsupported webpages (outside of CAL FIREs network). Similar efforts will begin for federally designated "Communities at Risk".
- Efforts to roll out a 'CalMAPPER Mobile' app to improve field data collection is expected to rollout later this winter or early spring.





Goal 2: Strengthen Protection of Communities

• Strengthen the Protection of Communities

More frequent, larger, high-severity wildfires threaten communities throughout California, with vulnerable communities located across a range of landscapes with diverse vegetation types. While better forest management will reduce wildfire risk in California's forested regions, different strategies are required to protect much of the state's population that lives in cities and towns outside of forests. Building resilience in many of these communities relies on hardening homes, buildings and infrastructure, increasing defensible space and fuel breaks, and strengthening community planning and preparedness.











Policy Changes

- Changed liability standard for fire suppression costs
 SB332 (Dodd 2021)
- \$20 million to establish
 Prescribed Fire Claims Fund
 SB926 (Dodd 2022)
- Requirement to develop proposal for CA Prescribed Fire Training Center AB642 (Friedman 2021)



Policy Changes

- Cultural burning officially recognized and defined in state law
 SB332 (Dodd 2021) & AB642 (Friedman 2021)
- Cultural practitioners have access to liability changes and claims fund SB332 (Dodd 2021) SB926 (Dodd 2022)

PBAs

- Continue to support development and success of PBAs through funding, permitting, cooperative burning, etc.
- Educate local CAL FIRE staff on the importance of this work and recent policy changes



CARX

- Fewer than 10 state-certified burn bosses since program was mandated in 2018
- Need more instructors
- Committed funding/support?
- Ensure unit-level CAL FIRE staff understand and respect certification



Liability/Insurance

- Liability changes per SB332 require CARX...
- Need to <u>quickly and collaboratively</u> establish Claims Fund, with intent to maximize utility and effectiveness of the funding
- Further explore and utilize liability sharing pathways with CAL FIRE



Prescribed Fire Training Center

- Federal agencies moving forward with Western PFTC; need to invest in state/private/cultural training models
- Immediate opportunities—invest in places/partnerships that are already successfully leading this work
- Continue to develop new landscapes and partners for training



Cultural Burning

- Address issues around tribal sovereignty and burn permitting
- Identify Cultural Burning Liaison (per AB642)
- Continue to support and respect cultural tradition and practice

Damage Inspection Program past

The Past

- Prior to 2015, no centralized program
- Low tech paper data gathering
- Varying data collection fields
- Varying final report standards
- Subjective based on Incident Management Team, political environments, location, other reasons

Damage Inspection Program Overview

Since the Boles Fire

- 2015 through 2022 fire seasons saw a significant number of structures damaged or destroyed
- DINS deployed on 54 major fires throughout the state
- 56,000 + damaged or destroyed structures documented
 - Any permanent structure, min 120sqft in size




Soberanes Incident Damage Inspection Summary








