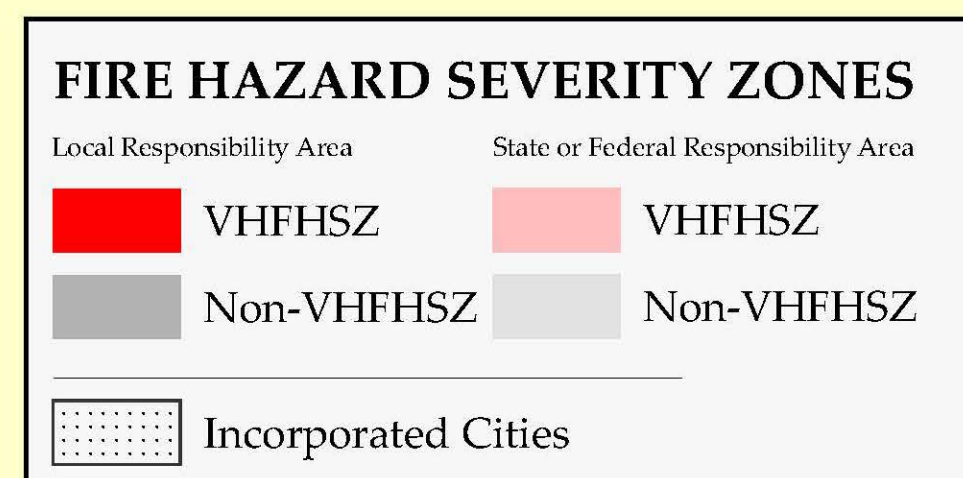


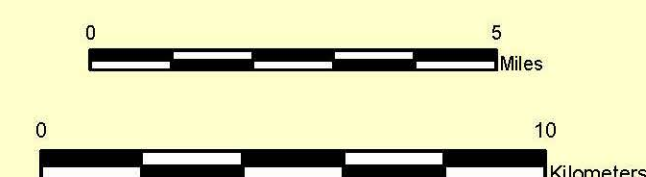


VERY HIGH FIRE HAZARD SEVERITY ZONES IN LRA

As Recommended By CAL FIRE



This specific map is based on a geographic information system dataset that depicts final CAL FIRE recommendations for Very High FHSZs within the local jurisdiction. The process of finalizing these boundaries involves an extensive local review process, the details of which are available at <http://tfap.cd.ca.gov/projects/hazard/btnle/> (click on "Continue as guest without logging in"). Local government has 120 days to designate, by ordinance, very high or hazard severity zones within its jurisdiction receiving the recommendations. Local government can also designate additional VHFHSZs. There is no requirement for local government to report their final action to CAL FIRE on the final VHFHSZs. Consequently, users are directed to the appropriate local entity (county, city, fire department, or Fire Protection District) to determine the status of the local fire hazard severity zone ordinance.
